



Guide 1: Understanding Uncertainty About Course Selection or Program Direction

1.1 Overview

It is common for students to feel uncertain about their course choices, academic pathways, or long-term career direction. i. **Reflect on Your Interests and Strengths:** Ask yourself:

- What type of work environment interests me?

Consider both academic interests and practical career preferences.

ii. **Evaluate the Difference Between Difficulty and Disinterest:** A course being challenging does not automatically mean it is unsuitable for you.

Ask:

- Am I struggling because the content is difficult?
- Or do I genuinely lack interest in the subject area?

This distinction is important to consider before making a major change.

iii. **Research Career Outcomes:** Many students lose confidence because they do not understand the opportunities connected to their degree.

Research:

- Career pathways
- Internship opportunities
- Professional certification.

Understanding future possibilities often improves motivation.

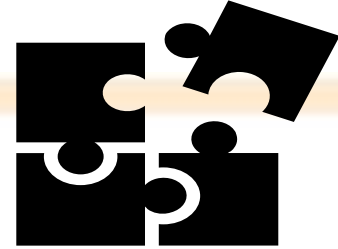
iv. **Speak with an Academic Counsellor:** Academic counsellors can help you:

- Assess whether a program change is necessary
- Compare academic pathways
- Review graduation implications
- Explore interdisciplinary opportunities

- Career Alignment: - The relationship between your academic program and your long-term career goals.
